

COMMUNITY LEVEL OUTCOMES

Outcomes are **community-scale results**:
the measurable aim or purpose of each Objective

- Each Objective has between 1 and 4 Outcomes
- Outcomes are the quantitative measurement of an Objective
- An Outcome may have multiple parts or options



Measured using:

- **Trend Lines** that capture progress over time
- **Thresholds** that establish a specific limit above or below which the community would receive full credit

LOCAL ACTIONS

Actions are the *steps you take* to achieve the Outcomes. STAR has 9 Action Types:

PREPARATORY ACTIONS

- Education and Outreach
- Plan Development
- Policy and Code Adjustment
- Partnerships and Collaboration
- Practice Improvements
- Inventory, Assessment or Survey

IMPLEMENTATION ACTIONS

- Programs and Services
- Facility and Infrastructure Improvement
- Enforcement and Incentives




INNOVATION & PROCESS

Communities can receive additional credit in STAR for demonstrating *innovation and best practices* outside of the traditional 7 goal areas.





BUILT ENVIRONMENT: STRENGTHS & OPPORTUNITIES

General takeaway:

- Highest performing objective – achieved 60% of points


Strengths and highlights:

- 90% of residents live within a half-mile walk distance of a park or public space and 100% live within 3 miles of an off-road trail
- Received credit for 6 transportation actions, including for increasing the mileage of sidewalks and bike lanes and passing a complete streets policy
- Met the Affordable Housing Preservation Outcome

Opportunities for improvement:

- Pass Unified Development Code to get points in multiple objectives
- Do Compact & Complete Communities spatial analysis
- Track transportation choices outcomes

CLIMATE & ENERGY: STRENGTHS & OPPORTUNITIES

General takeaway:

- One of the lower scoring goals, room for improvement, start with actions


Strengths and highlights:

- Progress in CE-5 Resource Efficient Buildings - Upgraded building codes, inspector trainings to enforce water and energy efficiency standards, and renovation of 7 municipal buildings
- Working with residents and businesses to recycle and reduce waste footprint

Opportunities for improvement:

- Track GHG emissions
- Perform a vulnerability assessment to assess potential climate change threats
- Create an outreach campaign to educate citizens and businesses on threats
- Consider a comprehensive programmatic and policy shift towards alternative fuels and renewable energy sources.

ECONOMY & JOBS: STRENGTHS & OPPORTUNITIES

General takeaway:

- Good job working with business community, could focus more on workforce dev


Strengths and highlights:

- Work locally and with regional partners to support and improve local businesses and grow the local economy
- Won a Small Business Association Growth Accelerator award to create the SouthWorks MakerLab business incubator
- Demonstrated increase in funds deposited in locally owned financial institutions
- Achieved points for all 8 actions in the targeted industries of Manufacturing, Retail, and Food & Accommodation

Opportunities for improvement:

- Look into actions to support citizens through the actions in EJ-4 Quality Jobs & Living Wages and EJ-6 Workforce Development

EDUCATION, ARTS & COMMUNITY: STRENGTHS & OPPORTUNITIES

General takeaway:

- Scored well in Community Cohesion, could work on other objectives

Strengths and highlights:


- 88% of residents live within one mile of a community venue with free events and programming
- Provide financial support for the arts through the Park Forest Art Fair and the Tall Grass Arts Association
- Equity and diversity training for local government staff and through programming around events like Black History Month

Opportunities for improvement:

- Develop an inventory of designated and eligible historic structures and sites
- Adopt a diversity policy for local boards and associations
- Focus on Educational Opportunity & Attainment

EQUITY & EMPOWERMENT: STRENGTHS & OPPORTUNITIES

General takeaway:

- Lowest scoring goal area, not uncommon


Strengths and highlights:

- Provide regular opportunities to meet with local gov staff and elected officials
- Developed a volunteer program to help residents get involved with the local gov
- Achieved 8.7 of the 10 available points in EE-2 Civil & Human Rights by demonstrating that all civil and human rights complaints in the past 3 years have been investigated and violations redressed in a timely manner

Opportunities for improvement:

- Investigate whether there are polluted and/or toxic environments that cause disproportionate health hazards to low-income residents and persons of color
- Conduct a community needs assessment to identify priority service needs and resources in the community

Park Forest STAR Analysis: Health & Safety



HEALTH & SAFETY: STRENGTHS & OPPORTUNITIES

General takeaway:

- Second highest scoring goal area – 50% of all points achieved


Strengths and highlights:

- Received credit in HS-1 Active Living for a complete streets policy, upgrades to the Aqua Center, and improved bicycle amenities
- Local public health department was accredited by the Public Health Accreditation Board in 2014
- Received a Class 4 ISO rating for superior fire protection
- Demonstrated an increase in the ability of low-income families to access low-cost, healthful food, as well as a decrease in the % of residents living in a food desert

Opportunities for improvement:

- Consider adopting a health-in-all policy for local decision-making
- Look into actions in HS-6 Natural & Human Hazards

Park Forest STAR Analysis: Natural Systems



NATURAL SYSTEMS: STRENGTHS & OPPORTUNITIES

General takeaway:

- Third highest scoring goal area, scored highly in NS-1 Green Infrastructure

Strengths and highlights:

- 57% of the jurisdiction's land area has protected vegetated surfaces
- 95% live within a 1/2 mile walk distance from a green infrastructure feature
- Three Year Ecosystem Enhancement Plan helped to regain control of invasive and exotic species such as cattail and reed canary grass in the Central Park Wetlands
- Received credit for Rail Fan Park prairie establishment, the Thorn Creek Woods Nature Preserve, and the Old Plank Road Trail

Opportunities for improvement:


- Use wetland projects for credit in NS-5 Water in the Environment
- Adopt advanced parking strategies in the Unified Development Code to improve NS-4 Outdoor Air Quality

POTENTIAL IDEAS STEPS FOR IMPROVEMENT
